



The Bone-in-the-Stone Rule



The consonant-vowel-consonant-silent e rule: When a word ends in a silent e, the vowel that comes before the e will be long and will say its name. To help you remember, mark the long o and silent e this way: **bōnĕ sĭōnĕ**.
